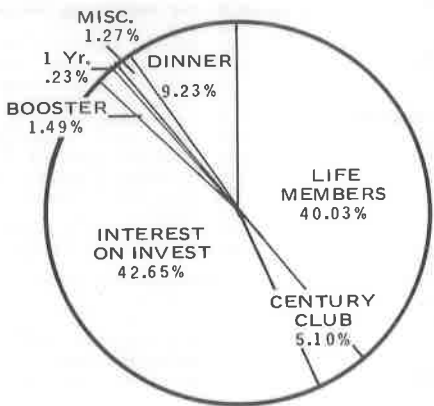

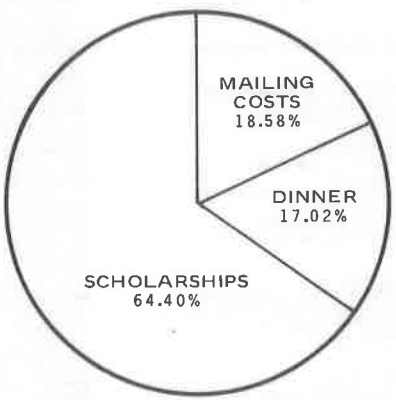

1971 SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

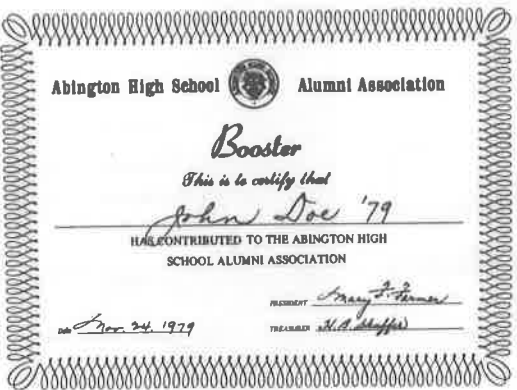

U.S. astronauts walked on the moon; Dwight Eisenhower, Judy Garland and the Saturday Evening Post died; and millions protested against the war in Vietnam. Dr. Glathorn was AHS principal. The football record was 11-0. Cheltenham couldn't find the Ghost and suffered a 60-6 defeat. Abington came forth with a first this year by forming The Black Theatre Workshop. Sally Kerchner and Jim Lesko were recognized for Most Service to School. Senior production of "West Side Story" was long remembered.

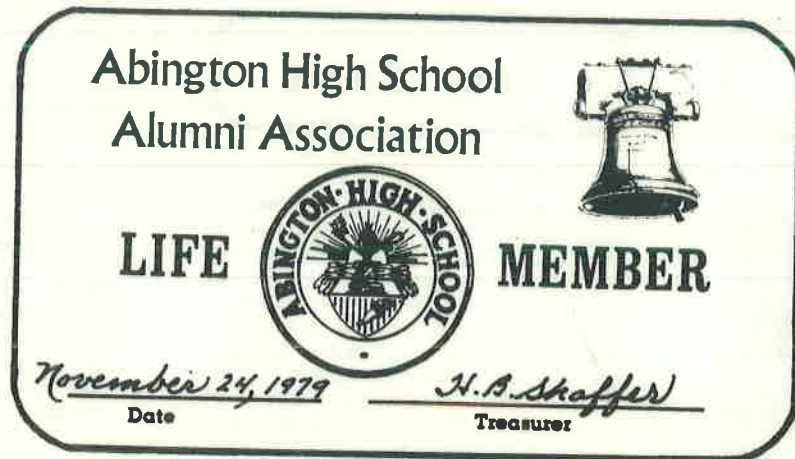
