## THE MUSIC THEATER OF ABINGTON

Seventeen stouthearted and musically talented AHA graduates who studied music under T. Carroll (Obie) O'Brien, vocal music director at Abington High in the 30's and 40's, conceived the idea of forming an amateur musical show group to bring high-level Broadway shows to the local area. AHS Alumni Assn. was asked to sponsor the undertaking and loaned the organization substantial funds to produce their first musical "The Mikado" in 1950 under the direction of Obie's widow, **Thelma Dinwoodie (O'Brien), '28**. The \$300 profit from the first show was turned over to the Alumni Association.

After two years of doing Gilbert and Sullivan operettas, the group moved on to light opera, presenting Victor Herbert and Sigmund Romberg shows. These productions were so well done that they sold out completely and the alumni loan was repaid. In 1953 the Alumni Association and MTA parted financially, bylaws were established and The Music Theater of Abington name was registered.

This same year a music scholarship fund was established and named as a memorial to Mr. O'Brien. More than \$44,000 has been awarded to 76 graduating students in 33 years to further their music studies, as well as numerous cash awards to other gifted and deserving students.

The Music Theater of Abington was the first theatrical organization to take advantage of the professional production facilities of the new south campus high school when completed in 1957. In appreciation, they purchased the original electronic organ for the auditorium, and in 1961 a piano was presented to the Abington Junior High School. After 18 years of use, the first organ was replaced and MTA contributed toward that purchase.

Two members of the original cast of 17 are still physically active in or for the show: **Lillian Leidy (Shriver), '36**, and **Don Neiman, '44**, past president, perennial scholarship chairman and offtime performer. One of the founders, **Bob Solly, '41**, past President and popular lead, was active until this year. **Betty Kidd (Solly) (Pritchard), '40**, joined Thelma O'Brien as music director of "Pinafore" in 1951 and directed 27 consecutive shows until she retired from the demanding job in 1978.

Audience size has diminished drastically over the years due to many amateur and professional musical show groups and dinner-theatres

## HUNTINGDON SCHOOL PLAN STILL DEBATED

Last June it was 19 months since plans to convert the historic Huntingdon Junior High School building on Susquehanna Road to senior citizen apartments were announced. Abington school board has complained that the township's delay in approving the plan is costing the school officials \$140,000 a year to maintain the Huntingdon School and might scare off the developer.

In December 1984, Rosenberg, Freeman and Associates of Washington and Ann Arbor, Mich., signed an agreement with the school district to buy the five-acre property for \$1.75 million. With township permission, the firm would demolish the gymnasium and build 208 apartments in existing buildings and in a new five story building.

The neighbors objected that it was too much and the developer submitted a revised plan. The gym was back in, the number of apartments was dropped to 158 and their size was reduced, parking plans were changed and there would be no new building. It appears that there will be many more meetings and delays ahead before a vote can be taken.

Rosenberg's was among five or six proposals received for the school which once had 1,800 students and is on the National Register of Historic Places. School officials said their plan was superior because it would generate tax revenue while preserving the historic buildings, cause a minimum of disturbance in the neighborhood and serve a laudable social goal...housing the community's elderly.

### RAY COLEMAN RETIRES

"It's fabulous. A 33 year-old love affair. To think you've enjoyed what you're doing for 33 years. As far as I'm concerned, there's nothing greater than working with kids. A big school like this, a little guy like me involved with the program. I just happened to be in the right place at the right time." These were Ray's sentiments when asked about his involvement with the school's athletic program.

Born on a mountaintop in Alpine, Tennessee in 1925, Ray at age two, moved with his family to Hatboro and, at 12 he worked on a farm 10 hours a day for 10 cents an hour. He was honorably discharged as a sergeant in 1946 after serving 20 months of WW II in China, Burma and India. He graduated from East Stroudsburg College in 1950 and later acquired 30 credits at Temple University.

As a permanent substitute teacher of History, English and Spelling in the Abington School District he transferred to the Senior High in '53 to coach football, soccer, basketball as well as girl's swimming, golf, baseball and track. Ray also found time to establish the Driver Education Program.

"During my career I've seen over 25,000 students pass through Abington, seen over 6,000 high school contests, outlived nine superintendents and seven principals."

Ray has three grown children and plans to spend some time with them as well as his parents who still enjoy pretty good health. He says "I like the sun, maybe I'll go on a Love Boat cruise or become a beach bum."

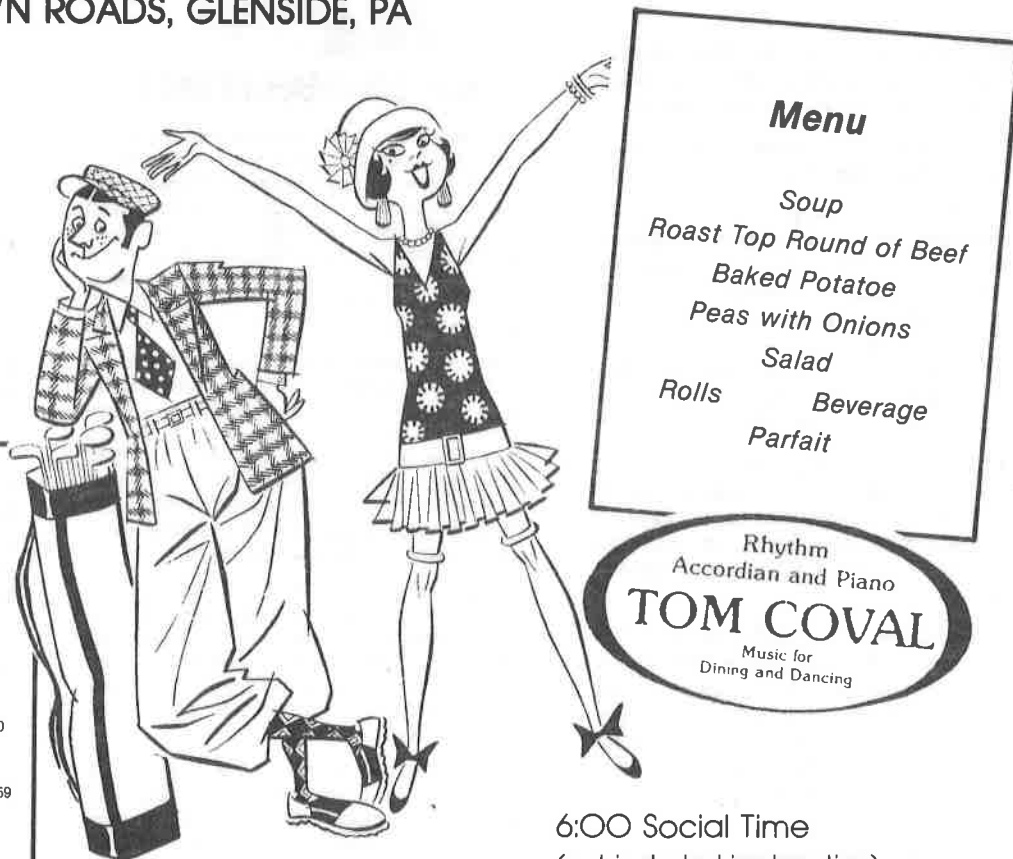

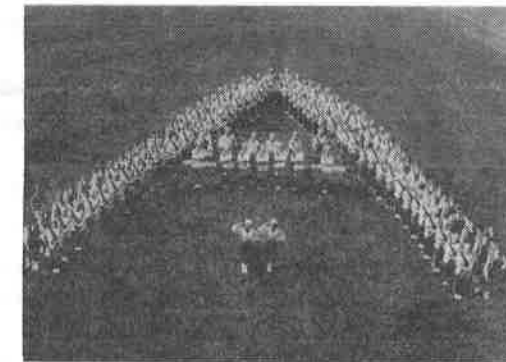

## ABINGTON PLACES FIRST IN CAVALCADE OF BANDS

Drums boomed, horns blared and drill teams clad in multi-colored uniforms pranced about the field as the marching bands melded into abstract shapes. This was the scene at the Hershey Park Stadium and Arena last November when 40 bands from Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware participated in the Cavalcade of Bands main event.

Abington captured first place in the American conference, winning two awards for marching and general effect, which includes visual and musical presentation. It was the first time the school has won a championship in the Cavalcade since 1976, when it won first place in the Yankee division. Bands that compete in the Cavalcade are categorized into four conferences according to three criteria: the size of the band, the enrollment in the grades from which the



band draws its members and the band's placement in the previous year's competition.

The four conferences, in order of size and degree of difficulty, are Yankee, Liberty, American and Independence. Abington slipped from the Yankee division to the American division in 1980

because of its declining student enrollment, which resulted in fewer band members.

Eight judges rated the bands on uniformity, music, precision and marching. Two judges, the execution music judge and the execution marching judge, view the bands from the field. The remaining six judges watch from a vantage point at the top of the stands. Each band is allotted 15 minutes and performs three to five songs. This year's Cavalcade drew an estimated 25,000 fans in the two nights and had about 5,000 participants.

"We had a very balanced presentation, and we were strong in all areas," band director Joseph Mauro said after Abington's win. "We had an excellent drill presentation, and the quality of music presentation was excellent all year."

## \$1000 BEQUEATHED TO SCHOLARSHIP FUND

After spending more than forty years teaching, counselling, and encouraging students to further their education, it is natural that she should plan to continue that relationship by leaving \$1000 of her estate to the Abington Alumni Scholarship Fund where it will be held in perpetuity, with the income from it helping to provide scholarships for Abington graduates each year.

A fitting memorial to **Emma C. Haldeman**, who can be remembered by students who studied at Abington during the years between 1948, when she came as an English teacher, then going into Guidance until she retired in 1968, even returning on a substitute basis for a time thereafter.

Miss Haldeman graduated from

Newtown High School, West Chester Normal School, University of Pennsylvania, and received a Master's Degree from Temple University. She taught at Springfield, Delaware County from 1928 to 1948, at which time she came to Abington.

Evalyn H. Haldeman, the Executrix, supplied us with the details of her sister's life, including the fact that gardening, handwork, reading and travel brought pleasure to her leisure time until her eyesight became impaired as a result of diabetes. She was born in Feasterville, Bucks County in 1907 and died in Abington in 1985... what a wealth of education she gave students during those years, and will continue to give through her bequest.
