In 1936, two years before **Norman Kelly** was graduated from Abington High School, he became a pen pal with a German boy of his same age. This past September, 51 years later, Bernhard Pflaum and his wife, Gertrude, made their first trip to the US to visit with Norman and Eva Kelly. From the beginning of their many years of corresponding, they traditionally ended with the slogan "Here's to World Peace," but this was interrupted by World War II and they lost touch between 1941

and 1947. During the intermission, Pflaum was drafted into the German Army and was later imprisoned in France for two years. Kelly served with the US Navy in the Pacific. After the War, and through the help of World Tape Pals, they were reunited by tape cassettes rather than letters. They all met for the first time when the Kelly's went to Europe in 1975. And now, in 1987, we may all again say "Here's to World Peace."

\$7700 IN SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED BY ASSOCIATION

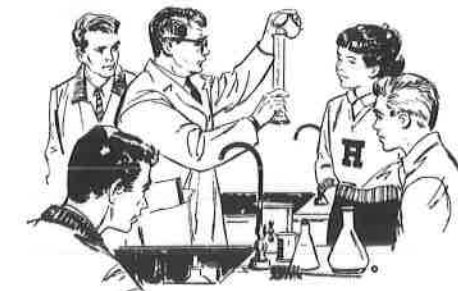

Karen E. Weaver

Karen E. Weaver, Class of 1976, is the new head field hockey coach at Ohio State University having been chosen from the more than sixty other applicants.

At Abington, she played basketball and LaCrosse, but was All-Suburban One league player in Field Hockey in both her Junior and Senior years. Karen was graduated from Lock Haven University in 1980 with a BS in physical education and biological sciences and was named all-America in her Senior year. She received her Masters Degree from Perdue University in 1983, a year after she began her career at Salisbury (MD) State College.

The 5-year coaching record she amassed was 65-22-2 which included the NCAA Division III national title in field hockey last Fall, Salisbury's first year ever. Karen developed her coaching philosophy from her years as goalkeeper, a spot often ignored by coaches. "As a goalie, you learn to train and motivate yourself," she said. "So I tried to develop a coaching style that took into account what I wanted as an athlete."

When she takes over at Ohio State this Fall, Karen's aim is to make her school competitive within five years, the same length of time it took to win a national title at Salisbury. They've never had a national championship in field hockey at Ohio State. Attention Division I of the Big 10 Conference: HERE COMES KAREN!

BEQUESTS BENEFIT SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Edith Tuteur Roll's years at Abington High School "were undoubtedly among her happiest," claims her brother, Fred ('28), whose \$3,000 memorial in his sister's name has greatly enhanced the Scholarship Fund of the Alumni Association. The many friendships she formed in her 1925 class at Abington High became lasting relationships until her death in October of 1986.

Prior to settling at Cape Cod in the early sixties, Edith was employed as a home lighting consultant by the Philadelphia

Electric Company. In her years of retirement her interest in helping other people was noted in her participation in local charities and church projects. Though the handicaps brought on her by Parkinsonism became a burden in her last years she showed great courage and seldom complained.

Fred Roll believed that the fostering of education through the Scholarship Fund would be a most appropriate memorial to a woman who cared about helping someone in need.

Dorothy E. Studley was a woman dedicated to teaching and sharing her talents to improve the education of students. In keeping with that commitment she bequeathed \$1,000 of her estate to the Scholarship Fund where it will be held in perpetuity, with its interest being used as scholarships for deserving Abington graduates.

Born in Massachusetts, she moved to Pennsylvania at an early age and attended the Abington schools from the third grade level at Glenside-Weldon through high school, graduating in 1932. Miss Studley received her Elementary Education Teaching Certificate from the Illman-Carter Unit of the University of Pennsylvania, her Bachelor's and Master's degrees, as well as Elementary Principal's

Certificate, were earned at Temple University.

Following seventeen years of teaching at Cedar Road Elementary School, she spent twenty years as principal at Roslyn Elementary, where she implemented numerous changes. Between school years she was active in the summer playground program, sharing her talents in crafts.

Upon retiring and moving to the Poconos in 1972, she "gave generously of herself in many ways to help those in need," according to her close friend, Evelyn Halde- man. The recipients of the Abington High School Alumni Association Scholarships will be among the many fortunate people who will benefit from her generosity.
