Hall of Fame 1994

Six alumni were inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1994. Principal Norman Schmid introduced the awardees at an all-school assembly last fall, and the awardees spent the day visiting classrooms at the high school. That evening, they were honored at a dinner open to the Abington schools community.

A plaque bearing the names of the 48 alumni inducted into the Hall of Fame since its inception in 1988 is on display in the high school auditorium lobby.

The 1994 awardees are:

David E. Stone, Class of 1965 (Arts). He is an Academy Award-winning sound effects and dialogue editor for films, television and cartoons. Among his movie credits are "Die Hard," "Willow," "Twilight Zone," "Top

Gun," "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade," and "Dracula." A 1969 graduate of Cornell University with a bachelor of fine arts degree, he has taught film at Boston's Orson Welles Cinema.

William G. Zimmerman, Class of 1950 (Athletics). A former wrestler, he was recently inducted into the Pennsylvania Coaches Association Hall of Fame in recognition of his achievements as a wrestler and wrestling coach. While at Abington, he won the District One title as a senior and received the Out-

standing Wrestler award. He became head wrestling coach at Harriton High School in Rosemont, Pa., and in 32 years, his teams have achieved a record of 311-121-2.

William S. Ripley III, Class of 1959 (Business). Working his way up from a buyer and product developer at Strawbridge & Clothier, he became president of the Pfaltzgraff Co. and later president and chief operating officer of Neutrogena Corp., one of the Fortune 500's top 100 companies.

Ray Jackendoff, PhD, Class of 1961 (Education). A leading authority in his field, he earned a degree in mathematics from Swarthmore in 1965 and a doctorate in linguistics from MIT in 1969. 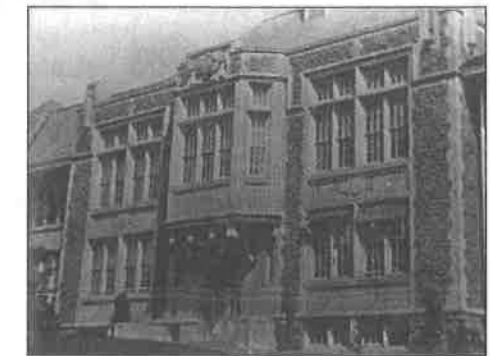
Latest offer to buy old school falls through

The former Huntingdon Junior High School on Susquehanna Road, vacant for nearly 15 years, looks to stay that way after the latest offer for the building was turned down as "inadequate."

At its Jan. 10 meeting, the Abington School Board turned down an offer from Canus Corp. of Philadelphia to buy the building for \$600,000. Canus planned to turn the building into retirement apartments. The building, which was the district's high school until 1956, was closed in 1983.

The district is seeking \$1 million for the 5½-acre property, which includes the school and the original Abington High School, built in the 1890s. Remodeling restrictions apply to the latter building, which is on the National Register of Historic Places.

Sale of the property has been hampered in part by the costs a buyer would face in bringing it up to fire code standards and state

mandates for handicap access. In addition, removing asbestos if the buildings' interiors were remodeled could cost up to \$250,000. The district has chosen not to retain the school because of these costs and new standards for classroom size, which mandate more square footage per pupil than was required when the building opened in 1908.

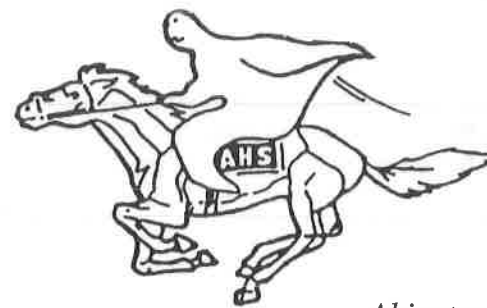

Former teacher to turn 100

From the last years of the Victorian era to the O.J. Simpson case, "in 100 years, you have so many things to remember," says former Abington teacher Dorothy Cathell, who will turn 100 on April 4.

"I can remember Queen Victoria's death in 1901—I was 5 years old. Our Merchantville (N.J.) fire bell tolled and Mother said, 'Go find out why it's tolling,'" Miss Cathell said during a recent interview at the

Evergreens retirement home, where she has lived since 1989. "I can remember the first automobile I saw—that was about 1904 or '05. I can remember the first airplane I saw in the air. It was probably about 1912 because there was an air race from New York to Philadelphia, and we stood on a dock on the Delaware to watch the race come through."

In addition to the century's milestones, Miss Cathell remembers many of the students she taught during 35 years at Abington. She corresponds with many of them, and sent 200 Christmas cards this past year.

Chance brought Miss Cathell to Abington in 1922. A Camden native, she had been teaching at Collingswood High School when

a friend called. She had accepted one job, then received another offer. Would Miss Cathell take the job teaching English at Abington so the friend could take the Temple University job?

So began Miss Cathell's long association with the high school and its publications. She started working with the *Abingtonian* in 1926, two years after its founding, and in 1936 became the faculty adviser to

the *Oracle*. The student publications won numerous awards during her tenure.

Miss Cathell graduated from Camden High in 1912 and took two years of teacher training at the city normal school, then worked and attended the University of Pennsylvania for her degree, which she earned in 1921. She completed her master's in 1924. She gives much credit to professor Dennis O'Bolger at Penn. "He was the man who made me learn how to write," she said. "He could make more fuss over a dangling participle."
