Memories

In last year's edition of Ghost Stories, we introduced a feature on Abington-area places that are gone but not forgotten, and asked you to send us your reminisces. The response has been great, and we've selected a few (as space permits) to publish.

Richard Gorkes Jr. '70 recalls one summer afternoon during his first year at Huntingdon Junior High when he and classmate Larry Reese '70 went to the Abington Snack Shoppe to enjoy a "Dusty Road." That was "ice cream piled high with malt powder and other stuff." They indulged themselves in those calorie-rich sundaes as they listened to the juke box playing the latest Beach Boys record.

William F. Clark '63 spent many happy winter days sledding on the hills of the old Baederwood Country Club (the present site of Hechinger's and the former John Wanamaker store). His next stop would be the Hot Shoppe at York Road and the Fairway. He asks how many alumni remember the trolley barn at the intersection of Easton and York Roads in Willow Grove?

Taylor Oughton '43 recalls playing in the trumpet section of the AHS band (under Leonard Smith in the early '40s) in the bandstand at Willow Grove Park, an historic site. "Sousa and Handy and all the band greats were heard and seen for so many years here playing the songs and marches they wrote," Taylor recalls. After a band concert, he'd ride the Thunderbolt with his best girl, who turned out to be Betty Kauffman Oughton '43.

Clare Yoder Levy '24 remembers Krewson's general store on Easton Road across from the former Casa Conti. Stanleigh Krewson graduated from AHS in 1918, his sister Dorothy in 1922. The general store may have later become Madonna's Unity-Frankford Market. Clare also remembers the grade cross-

Plans under way for new stadium

Fund-raising and initial plans have begun for a new stadium for Abington High School, in the wake of the sale of the former Huntingdon Junior High School last year.

The sale of the former school meant that the football team and marching band lost the staging and meeting facilities they used before home games at Memorial Field. Last fall, the high school's Parents Advisory Council for Athletics began a community fund-raising project and presented concept designs to the community.

At present, the athletic department is looking into using Upper Moreland High School's stadium for three home games in 1997, a plan recommended by the school board Facilities Committee. Those games would be Sept. 13, Oct. 4 and Oct. 25. 215-884-4700.

The Facilities Committee also recommended that the school district begin interviewing architects to design a stadium. The school board will make a financial contribu-

> tion to the project, and will have final approval of the architect.



Alumna is inducted into national sports hall of fame

Madelyn Braccio Chiomento '38, the country's all-time winningest field hockey coach, was inducted into the National High School Hall of Fame last year, and is to be inducted into the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame this year, capping a lifetime of coaching achievements and awards.

"Bunny" Chiomento had a record of 410-106-89 in her 40-year coaching career. (She retired in 1995 from her coaching job at Pitman High School in Gloucester County, N.J.) Her teams won four state championships and 19 Tri-County championships, and chalked up 35 consecutive winning seasons (1959 to

On April 3, she'll be inducted into the City of Philadelphia All-Star Chapter of the Pennsylvania Hall of Fame.

In 1995, she received the National Field Hockey Coach of the Year Award. Her other honors include induction into Abington High School's Hall of Fame in 1991, the Gloucester

County (N.J.) Hall of Fame in 1983, and the Temple University Hall of Fame in 1980.

A resident of Woodbury, N.J., she coached at Palmyra High School in 1954 and 1955, and at Pitman High from 1956 to 1993. She has continued to assist the current head coach since giving up the head job.

"Never in a million years did I think I could accomplish what I did," Chiomento told the Gloucester County Times in an interview last year. "I just enjoyed what I did and all the good that came out of it.

"I saw my players mature and that meant more than the wins. Of course, you want them to win, but once the game is over, you forget about it. I just told my players to go in there, have fun and do the best they can."
